



# JCI MANILA'S DIAMOND

YEARS OF PIONEERING POSITIVE IMPACT

he vogue of social history has vastly enriched our understanding of the past. It has provided a forum for many voices, people whose experiences are as much a part of our collective subconscious as the actions of our community leaders. We have arrived at a moment of history often marked by a conspicuous absence of leadership in nearly every realm of our lives. Our era is characterized by cynicism and the steady erosion of trust in our public institutions. So many of our communities' hunger for inspired, honest and committed leadership is evidenced by the countless episodes of street demonstrations and salient issues taken to the judgment of public opinion.

It is within this context that Junior Chamber International Manila (JCI Manila) quickly became a crucible for promising young men who long for leadership. For seventy-five years, it has fulfilled a critical need by serving as the premier leadership training and service organization in this part of the world.

### FROM THE ASHES OF WAR, A YOUTH MOVEMENT IS BORN

Manila, 1947. It was just two years after the Second World War. What was once touted as the "Pearl of the Orient," was reduced to a wasteland heap of ash and rubble. Seventy percent of its utilities, factories, 80 percent of the southern residential district, and 100 percent of the business district was laid to waste. More than 100,000 innocent victims were slaughtered in a ferocious orgy of killing. Desolation and despair gripped the once-sprawling capital as countless lay orphaned, homeless and hopeless. The economy was in shambles, there was no water, no electricity and very little food.

Yet, it was amid such a bleak landscape, our history's darkest and bleakest atmosphere, which sparked the birth of the greatest youth movement in Asia... all with the trademark curiosity of one 27-year-old First Lieutenant of the Reserve Force Philippine Army and a successful realty entrepreneur by one Artemio Limtuaco Vergel de Dios, who went by his favorite moniker, "Temiong."

During one sunny morning of July 30, 1947, while he was traversing the streets of Escolta, Manila, then popular for its row of shops selling PX goods – an old appellation for "Post Exchange," a service mark used for a store on a military base that sells goods to military personnel and their families or to authorized civilians – that Temiong chanced upon an October 1946, Volume 18 issue of PIC

Magazine, a pulp magazine for young men published by Street & Smith Publications.

In it, an inspiring article by Ed Cunningham detailed the exploits of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce that featured Seldon Waldo, an attorney from Gainesville, Florida, who served as the United States Junior Chamber National President in 1946-47, had piqued his interest. Temiong thought to himself, "If such organization was needed in the United States, it is much more needed here." His unbridled passion drove him to write to Seldon Waldo to inquire how a similar organization could established in the be Philippines.


The idea of having young Filipinos make a positive difference in forging a better nation through this movement inspired Temiong no end that he enthusiastically drafted a letter to the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce office in Tulsa, Oklahoma, requesting for more information about the Jaycees.

Unbeknownst to him, however, a similar idea was being concocted by another young man in the person of Gregorio "Greg" M. Feliciano, a sales from executive the Manila Commercial Airline Office of Northwest Airlines. After reading a similar article from another publication. he expressed his intention to his immediate superior, Bertram "Bert" J. Talbot, a Traffic Manager and a former member of the St. Paul Jaycees from Minnesota. With Bert's help, Greg was able to telegram Taylor S. Cole, then President of Junior Chamber International (JCI).

Under the endorsement of Cole from the United States, a series of correspondences between Vergel de







Dios and Robert H. Richards, the Executive Secretary for External Affairs of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce, were made. "You are to be commended for the enthusiasm which you have accentuated in your letter and for desire the to propose an organization of the young men of Manila into a Junior Chamber of Commerce," the letter wrote. "We, on the mainland, fully realize the situation as it now exists in your city and we shall do everything possible to assist you in any way to formulate plans for Fil-Jaycees." Together with an information kit came with a note advising to contact Bert Talbot.

This resulted in a meeting on September 25, 1947 at the Oak Room of the Manila Hotel between Vergel de Dios and Bertram J. Talbot, a former JCI member from St. Paul, Minnesota, then stationed as a traffic manager of Northwestern Airlines in Manila, who was referred by Talbot to assist the former in setting up the first JCI chapter in the country. In that meeting, Talbot also brought along Greg Feliciano.

The meeting proved very productive. The proponents pored over the materials sent by Bob Richards and agreed to arrange a formal organizational meeting on December 20, 1947.

At 12:00 noon of "D-Day," the first formal organizational meeting pushed through, despite the fact that, out of a projected sixty confirmed attendees, only sixteen were able to make it. At the Champagne Room of the Manila

Hotel, history was being made, as nine Filipinos and seven American expatriates agreed to form a committee to draft a constitution and by-laws so that the same could be submitted for approval by the members. They also agreed to designate the Northwest Airlines office as their temporary command center, until such time that a permanent headquarters could be established. With the support of other United States JCI Members who were stationed as multi-national expatriates in Manila, as well as other rising young Filipino businessmen, the Manila Junior Chamber of Commerce, more known as the Manila Junior Chamber of Commerce, was formed. It was on this date that the JCI Movement in the Philippines officially began.

### FIRST PROJECTS

The "Clean-Up Week," which ran from February 23 to 28, 1948 was the single biggest success story of this fledgling organization in its first year. Under the leadership of Oscar J. Arellano, the young men of Manila Junior Chamber of Commerce systematically made use of its meager resources to get the job done in less than months' time. Constant conferences with city officials yielded 200 laborers and 20 dump trucks from the Offices of the Health and City Engineer. Frequent press releases and radio promotions were conducted to entice the public

to cooperate with the project. Quasi-government organizations, such as the PHILRYCOM, contributed 47 U.S. Army trucks for the drive; while private companies, such as La Tondeña, Inc., the Filipinas Compania de Seguros, and the Philippine Guaranty Company, contributed substantial financial assistance. All in all, the drive swept away 7,000 tons of garbage and refuse.

With the momentum gathered from this campaign, several projects came in quick succession: a Youth Rally with over 17,000 college and

university students participating and hearing the main speaker, Philippine President Elpidio Quirino; the extension of relief to the Camiguin Island victims of the Mt. Hibok-Hibok eruption; the representation at the Third JCI World Congress on March 27, 1948 at Rio de Janeiro, where the only Filipino delegates, Greg Feliciano and Jose "Peping" N. Mayuga, were elected "on the spot" as the first Vice-President for Asia and JCI Director, respectively. A high point was reached that year when the charter presentation of the Philippine Junior Chamber of Commerce was presented by JCI World President Taylor Cole to the two Filipino delegates.

### **BIRTH OF A NATIONAL MOVEMENT**

The prominence of the JCI movement, brought about by these "high impact" projects, was the sole key in the wildfire-like conflagration of the Jaycee ideals and enthusiasm in the provinces. The intrepid JCI Members from Manila fanned out to major towns and cities in the north and south, extending chapters and spreading the noble spirit of JCI. The first chapter to be extended outside Manila was the Cebu Jaycees (now,





JCI Cebu) on April 18, 1948, with Fulvio C. Pelaez as its charter President. By the end of 1948, a total of eight chapters comprised the national organization, namely, San Pablo, Cabanatuan, Capiz, Lucena, Bacolod, and Iloilo.

The period following the formation of the first eight local organizations was characterized by different projects: the fly and mosquito eradication campaign, the establishment of puericulture centers, the construction of monuments, full cooperation as donors to local blood banks of the Red Cross. and the "Get-Out-the-Vote" campaign in connection with the November 8, 1949 national elections, where thousands of posters urging people and exercise to vote their democratic right, were distributed to all the major provinces.

Subsequent to the first National Convention on February 11 to 13, 1949, where the first set of national officers, led by National President Ramon V. del Rosario, was elected and its constitution and by-laws





formulated, more JCI local organizations were organized, which boosted the pre-convention number of eight chapters to twenty-two: Zamboanga, Davao, Tacloban, Lipa, Aparri, Vigan, Laoag, Baguio, Cotabato, Koronadal, Kalibo, Basilan, and Tarlac.

And this was just the beginning. Soon, new JCI local organizations would unfold that would shape the history of this organization.

The fire of JCI was impressively stoked by the pioneers throughout the islands that, by the end of 1948, ten other local chapters sprouted around the country. This paved the way for the founding of the Junior Chamber of the Philippines (now JCI Philippines), which held its first National Convention from February 11 to 13, 1949 in Manila, where its constitution and by-laws were approved. Ramon V. del Rosario was elected as JCI Philippines' first National President.

The unparalleled leadership and unprecedented community initiative best exemplified by JCI Manila members were recognized even beyond Philippine shores. Thus, it was on March 1, 1950, using much creativity and imagination, Manila had the distinction of hosting the 5th JCI World Congress — a first in Asian soil. There, Ramon V. del Rosario was unanimously elected the first Asian JCI President. The Congress marked the esteem with which JCI regarded the Philippine organization and the caliber of its members.



### THE FIFTIES: EXPANSION AND EVOLUTION


In the 1950s, a new generation of young men, mostly scions of wealthy ilustrado families, dedicated themselves to rebuilding post-war Philippines. Among the multi tude of projects of JCI Philippines, the Manila chapter held the most memorable ones.

The fifties were a time of innocence and innovation. Many of the traditional projects of the chamber were instituted during this period. Sports competitions, such as the "Diamond Gloves for Boys" national boxing competition in 1955, and the "Walkathon" endurance contest, first launched in 1958, aimed to promote a community of healthy citizens. But perhaps the most acclaimed public service deed was shown when medical teams were sent to Vietnam in 1954 on a project named "Operation Brotherhood," the primary purpose of which was to medical assistance give to war-stricken victims. The brainchild of 1951-1952 President Oscar J. Arellano, the project ran for three years and reached global

proportions, as it was later adopted by Junior Chamber International.

Indeed, the fifties have successfully laid a solid foundation for the future generations of JCI members to traverse. Included in the JCI Manila's program of involvement was the realization that present concern is not enough: to promote future involvement, others have to be led to make such a choice. The expended efforts have been met with success. The "Voice of

Democracy," conceived by Amelito R. Mutuc and Ramon V. del Rosario, and later instituted by the chapter in 1951, for example, aimed to encourage the Filipino youth to evaluate the present form of political rule in the country. A second example of the chapter's involvement was seen during election time when civic consciousness was encouraged among the citizenry. Through the launching of "Get Out the Vote" campaign by Benjardi M. Crame, people were made to realize their inalienable right to choose their leaders through the ballot. They invited popular celebrities to join them in their campaign sorties and organized nationwide rallies aimed at increasing voter turnout in the 1949 presidential elections.

Another milestone undertaking was the formation of an institutional award to recognize young Filipino citizens who have directly contributed to the progress of the Filipino nation. This led to the establishment of the "Ten Outstanding Young Men" Awards (TOYM), first conceived on April 15, 1959 by Project Chairman Howard Q.

National Organization a year later and has remained its flagship project for the next five decades.

### THE SIXTIES: SUBLIMITY IN SERVICE

The entry of the 1960s saw the men of the young Beatles generation pursue the dream and vision of those who had served before them. As the fiscal year of JCI worldwide was made to coincide with the calendar year, the members of JCI Manila joined in the commitment and furthered the goal of "service to humanity." The decade opened with the chamber hosting the 10th JCI Multi-Nation Conference from April 26 to 30, 1960, where more than a thousand JCI delegates from all over the Asia-Pacific region attended. This was followed by a second hosting 18th JCI Multi-Nation Conference held on April 30 to May 4, 1968, which was attended by over 1,200 delegates from 18 countries, within the same decade. The projects in vogue were "Operation

Saklolo" in 1960, which aimed to provide relief operations to typhoon and flood-stricken victims nationwide; "Operation Godparents," which paid monthly visits to various orphanages in Manila, "Travel Philippines," a tourism campaign of JCI Manila in 1961 that sought to encourage more foreign visitors to visit the Philippines; and the launching of the Blood Bank Building in Leveriza, Manila in 1967, among countless other projects.

Sensing the need to reach out to other chapters who look up to them for guidance, JCI Manila conducted an ambitious provincial visitation project in 1963; and later, to key cities around the world, under its "Operation Friendship" program. Through their indefatigable efforts, "JCI Manila has shown to the Filipino people that applicable remedies are found... to serve as blueprints for change and renewal."



JCI Manila was awarded its first Minneapolis Trophy for the "Most Outstanding Chapter of the World" during the 17th JCI World Congress in Tel Aviv, Israel in 1963, earning a lasting distinction for its President, Aurelio O. Periquet, Jr. as the recognized leader who made it all possible. This same feat was followed in 1966 and 1967, indeed, an unprecedented accomplishment.

JCI Manila has shown to the Filipino people that applicable remedies are found without searching for new ideologies to serve as blueprints for change and renewal. Their optimism and success lie in their confidence and cognizance of the fact that internally available means exist, and it is for them to seek out these means. The inauguration of the Tondo Youth Center project in 1964, which hoped to provide vocational livelihood programs to "out-of-school" youth and indigent vagrants then abounding in Manila's slum district, is one such remedy. Other equally unique projects were the "Manila Boy Scouts Troupe," a Boy Scouts training program for poor Tondo boys; and the "Exchange of Children's Art and Crafts," where art products made by children from different hospices were sold with the products of international sister chapters. In 1966, several major new projects were undertaken, such as the "Art from the Silent World," an exhibition of 100 oil paintings by students of the School from the Deaf and Blind; "Save-A-Sight" project, a medical mission for the residents of





the depressed areas in Tondo and Leveriza districts.

The sixties also saw the chapter skyrocket into the global arena with its slew of innovative international projects. With its aim to promote tourism, the chamber launched the "Manila Festival," with the help of the City Government of Manila in 1963. In 1965, more than half of the 55 projects conducted by the Chapter were international in scope: the "Stop-Over Manila" campaign, where brochures were distributed to all Pan-American Airways Offices around the world; the "World Tensions Project," an ambitious Southeast Asian goodwill mission; and, the "On to Sabah" Project, aimed to diffuse tensions between Malaysia and the Philippines over their respective claims to Sabah.

JCI Manila was also at the forefront of public issues during this decade. It led a call for denouncing the of congressional granting allowances to congressmen, with their "Call to Arms!" manifesto, which was published in the leading dailies. With active a very Government and Economic Affairs Committees, it continued publishing its highly-regarded opinions through a regular weekly column in



the Manila Times, and issued a public stand against sending Filipino troops in Vietnam in 1966.

One of the landmarks of this decade was the establishment of the first "Heroes' Gallery" in Fort Santiago, as well as the launching of the first "Citizens' Awards" in honor of the "Ten Outstanding Policemen in Manila" in 1966 and the "Five Most Outstanding Firemen of Manila" in 1968. A joint project with the United States Peace Corps in a summer camp for boys was also conducted.

Under an inspired leadership, JCI Manila continued to enjoy the support of the country's highest leaders. Manifesting this reputation were the personal attendance of Philippine First Lady Imelda R. Marcos during the 1964 Induction Ceremonies, and the presence of Philippine President Ferdinand E. Marcos as guest-of-honor during its Induction Ceremonies in 1967, respectively.

### THE SEVENTIES: ACTIVISM AND ACCEPTANCE

In the 1970s, the ideals which sparked an entire generation to move the youth of the 1940s burned on unfalteringly in a newer and more militant generation of young and idealistic men. With the sterling goal of surpassing the feats of their predecessors, a multitude of projects were undertaken, some of which were the "Operation Bagong Pag-Asa," a medical program aimed to provide family health education, family planning, medical check-up, medical consultation and treatment to 2,500 of the most impoverished families in Tondo in 1970; the "Mushroom Spawn" Project, a home-based mushroom-culture livelihood training program for the "out-school-youth" with the long-range objective of boosting the export industry to bring in much-needed dollars; and the holding of the "First Manila Grand Prix," the first international competition of this nature, directed towards boosting tourism in the country.

JCI Manila refused to remain unattached to the activism of the decade. Where teach-ins and university-wide protest rallies have become a global phenomenon, the chamber showed its relevance by putting out position papers on the Price Control Bill, the Export Incentive Bill, and other important

economic issues. Some of these projects even led to a call for sobriety, following the violent student demonstrations in 1970, with the distribution of several thousand posters, urging the public to "win changes without losing lives."

The declaration of Martial Law in 1972 led to abnormal times for Manila. Due to the banning of many organizations, coupled by the unstable political brought about climate by a dictatorial decree, JCI Manila

concentrated in the "reawakening" of the JCI spirit among its members, the along with community image-building objectives, which were thought to be made compatible with the changing times.

They worked for a greater involvement in public affairs, and the promotion of a vigorous chamber image as a concerned with group the socio-economic and political problems besetting the nation, and committed to doing its share in their amelioration. With this strong commitment to the community, JCI Manila successfully initiated the "Turn-in-a-Pusher" project in 1972, "Operation CLEAN" in 1973, the first "Kawal Awards" Search for the outstanding Filipino soldier in 1974, and "Bahaghari Awards" for the "17 Most Outstanding Metro Aides" in 1979, inter alia.

The seventies were also a time for experimentation and "pushing the envelope." With major organizational changes within the chapter that tested the system, JCI Manila inked a deal with the Manila City Government for a 520-square meter property in Ermita, Manila,

where a permanent Clubhouse was to which was composed of past chapter presidents and luminaries, as well as generous sponsors and donors, the "bahay na tiza-style" JCI Manila Clubhouse was completed on November 19, 1977 and built at a cost of 600,000 pesos. On that same year, JCI Manila won its fourth Minneapolis Trophy as the "Most Outstanding Chapter of the World" at the 32nd JCI World Congress in





the chamber leadership turned its attention to assisting the needs of its local community. A number of medical assistance programs and dental clinics were set up to cater to the residents of Manila's poorest districts. With the funds collected from the profits of the recent Manila World Congress, the chamber busied itself with renovating the newly-built JCI Manila Clubhouse. Under the "Ilaw ng Kinabukasan" project, the chapter conducted a series of career guidance seminars for 300 public high school students all from over Manila. With '79" "Tagislakas project, the chamber held a sports competition for young enthusiasts, 18 years old and below, from 913 barangays in Manila who competed in seven events. Lastly, seminars on good leadership were administered to barangay district officials.

## THE EIGHTIES: ENERGY AND EMERGENCE

With the world paying witness to rapidly shifting political and social structures, the fall of dictatorial governments and the rise of people-empowered democracies have led JCI Manila towards addressing the changing needs of a community in search of political direction. Shifting its priorities to expanding the JCI movement in the outskirts of Manila, the chamber focused its sights on extension work. In a span of just one year, JCI Manila saw the establishment of five new JCI chapters in Bulacan and revived dormant chapters near the area. JCI Marinduque was also re-organized under their auspices. Aside from extension work, the chamber also conducted projects for Manila, particularly in the donation of water faucets and laundry facilities for the depressed areas of Malate, Leveriza, Pritil, and Paco. One of the memorable achievements of the term was the holding of the "Manila JCI Week," series where a of community-development programs were implemented, among which were the "Operation Linis," tax avoidance seminars, and diesel engine maintenance seminars.

Cognizant of the energy crisis affecting the nation, JCI Manila held

The "Tipid Lakbay Ng Kabataan" program for promoting the use of bicycles was launched this year to gas promote conservation in transportation one such was measure. Another was the search for the "Most Outstanding Energy Related Invention," that rewarded innovations energy-saving in devices in the years 1982 and 1983.

Blessed with a string of outstanding leaders who steered the chapter to unprecedented heights, that earned for the chapter its fifth and sixth "Outstanding Chapter of the World" Award in 1982 and 1983, respectively, JCI Manila went "Back to Basics," as its leadership vigorously campaigned to change the chamber's elitist image, mainly through the holding of joint projects and bid book seminars to other chapters. Among the decade's most notable projects were the "Adopt-a-Barangay" program, where the chapter chose four of the most depressed barangays in Manila train them for livelihood to programs, donated water faucets and provided free medical missions;

However, two of the most acclaimed projects stood out as becoming lasting institutions: the Camp "PAG-IBIG" program for physically-challenged children in

Lolarga, then the Superintendent of the Division of City Schools in Manila, who tapped the services of JCI Manila in entertaining more than 2,500 physically-challenged and mentally-handicapped children through a day camp especially organized for them. Through the continuing support of parents,

Buoyed by the promising prospects of a freer political atmosphere, that saw the demise of a 20-year dictatorship by a "People Power" revolution, the chamber leadership initially turned inward and focused its sights towards improving the financial status of the organization. With the influx of funds, a number of development projects were undertaken especially in the area of international affairs. To promote global camaraderie, its officers attended international seminars and sister chapter-hosted luncheon meetings.

In 1988, a series of activities that marked the 40th anniversary of JCI Manila was launched, among which were the publication of its first Trade Directory, the unveiling of the commemorative plaque at the Manila Hotel and a grand luncheon aimed to provide family health education, family planning, medical check-up, medical consultation and treatment to 2,500 of the most impoverished in Tondo.

### THE NINETIES: REFLECTION AND RENEWAL

The decade started auspiciously as the chamber administration, fresh from an explosive election fight, undertook programs focused on building better ties with the community through a number of innovative development projects. Activities, such as the S.A.N.G.G.O.L. ("Save And Nurture God's Gift of Life") project, which was aimed to provide support to indigent pregnant women; and, the C.A.S.H. ("Create A Sports Hero") program, where JCI members were tapped to adopt promising athletes in their quest for the gold medal at international sports meets, were all successfully done. Other worthy pursuits included the revival of some traditional projects, that included,

The year 1991 also saw the birth of the VANGUARD Seminar, which was later made a requirement before attaining full membership in the chapter. Under a string of an able and inspired leadership, the organization went on to conduct outstanding community projects, renewed ties with at least 7 international sister chapters and embarked on pursuing its bid for the

1998 JCI World Congress. A major undertaking was the "Animal Exchange Project" in 1993 that saw the exchange of local species of animals between the Philippines and Korea. JCI Manila was the recipient of the Formosan deer, while JCI Taegu Daedeok of Korea were the beneficiaries of the reticulated python and monitor lizard. In 1994, the chamber swept most major awards in the Metro Area, National, and International Congresses, as it received its seventh "Most Outstanding Chapter of the World" Award and its fourth "Most



This momentum drew a temporary setback when, during the 1994 Election for the Board of Directors, two opposing camps locked themselves in а bitter and hard-fought contest, which resulted in a searing and divisive fight that left deep-seated scars. The aftermath of the hotly contested elections of 1994 drew serious setbacks in forging chapter unity, as


appointments of project chairmen and implementation of major programs were stymied by an over-fiscalizing minority, which resulted in scaled-down projects. The issue of a four-way election tie was resolved midway in its term and an election protest filed before the Securities and Exchange Commission controversial prompted (SEC) constitutional amendments. Despite the modest projects, the chamber saw several worthwhile programs successfully undertaken afterwards. In 1996, the "Operation Damayan" bunkhouse project for the lahar-ravaged victims in Pampanga was done with the support of the JCI Taegu Daedeok of Korea and the JCI Kanto of Japan. The first "Happy Jesus Day" Project for the street children in San Juan was also one of

the programs that were made to secure membership and community participation. In 1998, the chapter 50th observed its founding anniversary. To celebrate this once-in-a-lifetime occasion, a grand reunion of 250 past members at the Grand Ballroom of the Manila Hotel on September 22, 1998 was held. Committed to continuing the hallmark of leadership excellence which characterized the chapter's

first fifty years, the chamber leadership marked the very successful hosting of the 53rd JCI World Congress in Manila that saw international 4,500 delegates gracing the seven-day event from November 15 to 20, 1998. Indeed, the nineties "Gen-X" members lent its share of milestones and glory, despite the challenges that threatened to diminish it.

## **THE 2000s: PROMISES IN PERSPECTIVE**

As the dawn of the new millennium rises for a new generation of leaders, JCI Manila stepped up to meet the new challenges that face the chapter. It was an auspicious start for the chamber in Y2K: the chapter administration marked a series of innovative achievements in area of internationalism. the Determined to support the national organization, with Past President Rafael "Boydee" P. Dizon III leading JCI Philippines National the Presidency for the first time in fifteen years, the chapter "lent" many of its outstanding members to assume key posts in the national

organization. Within the chamber, it spearheaded notable community projects, such as the "Calabash Dental Mission" and the "Anti-Pornography Rally" in Manila. The Year 2000 also marked a milestone in Seoul-Taegu-Manila JCI membership relations with the establishment of the first-ever


International Business Forum, a two-day investment mission.

In 2001, a strong, year-round sports development program, consisting of volleyball, bowling, billiards, golf, and basketball tournaments, was undertaken. It also saw the publication of its JCI Manila Membership Directory, a first since 1958. Breaking the 14-year trend of electing entrepreneurs to the chamber presidency, the term 2002 dared to be equally different, as the chapter leadership-initiated groundbreaking, yet financially modest projects that solidified JCI Manila as a perpetual trailblazer. Among the groundbreaking projects were the publication of the Digital Herald, the first chapter news organ distributed

The first "JCI Manila China Mission," where a 26-man delegation conducted a business tour and week-long chapter extension possibilities to Beijing, Xiamen, and Shanghai, set a landmark in international affairs. On the community front, the chapter has continued its worthwhile endeavors with the launching of the first "Patrol 117 Heroes Search" under the Department of Interior and Local Governments and its relief assistance to the typhoon victims of Camiguin.

In 2004, the chapter embarked on a string of innovative programs, such as the "Iron Deficiency Anemia Supplement" program, where more than 10,000 young high school girls from public educational institutions in Metro Manila were given iron supplement tablets. The project was cited by Junior Chamber International as a model "United Nations Millennium Development Goals" program.

The chapter also had the distinction of having its sole bet for the 2004 International Best Business Plan Competition cop the grand prize of

Five Thousand U.S. Dollars (US\$5,000.00). The winner, Christian Guerrero of Thames International Business School, a young Pinoy farmer and student-entrepreneur, submitted a business plan of developing а vegetable and fruit-farming franchise in his own province of Zambales. Guerrero was the national winner of JCI Manila's "Philippine First Young Entrepreneurs Business Plan Competition Search" on June 26, 2004, organized by JCI Manila.

The enthusiasm of the chapter leadership in its projects resulted in its biggest JCI awards haul in years a total of three (3) major awards – at the 59th JCI World Congress in Fukuoka, Japan - the most since 1991 when the chapter garnered the same number of awards during the 41st JCI World Congress in Helsinki, Finland. The awards won by the chapter included the "Most Outstanding LOM President of the World (Category I)" for JCI Sen. Jose Mamuric; "Most Amado L. Outstanding JCI Member of the World" for JCI Sen. Reginald T. Yu; and the "Best International Affairs Program."

In 2005, JCI Manila's leadership, under the auspices of one of its youngest-elected presidents in years, vowed to "Making the Best Even Better," as it worked on new community development programs. It promptly responded to the call of Typhoons Violeta, Winnie and Yoyong victims, which ravaged certain parts of Northern Luzon, by launching the "Kapwa Ko, Kadamay Ko" relief program; and helped fund Wheelchair the 7th Annual Basketball League. The following year, it embodied its "Leadership at Its Finest" theme by adopting a barangay in BASECO compound and rejuvenating membership interest with its gamut of poker, biking and hiking programs

Well aware of the plummeting relevance of service organizations under a shifting generation of increasingly self-absorbed, tech-savvy social media junkies, the

succeeding administrations sought to further raise its public profile through various awareness programs both in radio and print tri-media media. Through a with the partnership nation's leading mainstream media outlets, JCI Manila partnered with The Manila Times and launched the first weekly "Manila Jaycees on Air" on DWBL RADIO 1242AM, as well as having revitalized the official webpage of the chapter. JCI Manila also spearheaded memorable undertakings as, "Walking in the Art of Silence" for the benefit of the Philippine School for the Deaf, "Catechism and Feeding in BASECO," "High School Musical" stage play at the Meralco Theatre, the "Stock Market Series" seminars and "Joy in Living Foundation" project. It earned for the President Luisito P. Basilio Jr. its 6th "Most Outstanding JCI Local President of the World" award at the 63rd JCI World Congress in New Delhi, India in 2008.

The decade was capped with a magnificent celebration of the chapter's 60th Anniversary with a grand gala on December 11, 2007 at the Maynilad Ballroom of the Manila Hotel, where quests were transported back in time when the seeds of the JCI movement were still being planted in Asian shores. A musical extravaganza to punctuate the already moving audio-visual presentation and immersed its audience into a cavalcade of stirring emotions, climaxing into a catharsis of pride and personal joy by being part of this indescribable experience.

### **THE 2010s: GREATNESS IN GLORY**

The second decade of the new millennium signaled a seismic shift in the nation's cultural landscape, as the rise of big data and the new digital norm continue to empower the nameless individual. From storm surge to price surge to the rise of the Man from Davao, the decade saw the emergence of new political heroes and villains, a changing of the guard in different sectors of society, the growing concern for climate change taking a more desperate turn, and an unending cacophony of self-proclaimed pundits calling themselves "influencers" screaming into the Facebook void. climate change taking a more

Amid the blur of a fast-changing community panorama, the chapter was fortunate to have had forward-looking leaders who capitalized these emerging trends with their grand visions toward innovation, eschewing traditional programs and embarking on a series of new "legacy" projects that defined much of this decade. In 2010, JCI Manila transformed the once-squalid garbage waste disposal called Smokey area Mountain into a 60-by-60 football field which they christened "Field of Dreams" to the indigent Tondo residents, as part of its "Futbol Para



Palsy Symposium that benefitted more than 200 parents, caregivers and children annually, and the "Handog Lingap," a yearly project that provides a fun day for more than 850 special education students in Manila's various public schools under the Department of Education's Special Education Division (SPED) and their teachers for a day of fun and learning. Various activities would include art classes, games, and swimming lessons to be facilitated by the Bert Lozada Swimming School - its partner for the past six years for this project.

On November 8, 2013, the deadliest natural disaster in Philippine history left more than 7,360 people dead, injured more than 27,000 people, and left 240,000 people homeless as

Typhoon "Yolanda" pummeled through Samar and Leyte, driving a storm surge, a wall of seawater estimated to be 7.5 meters high. JCI Manila quickly organized "Oplan Damayan" as it received a deluge of cash and relief items from across the country that took five, 20-foot containers to hold and deliver to the affected victims.

In 2016, JCI Manila left no stone unturned in ensuring that "Brotherhood Beyond Borders" was laid out in grand fashion as he extended the hand of friendship among local organizations in JCI nation-wide Philippines via a training program termed as "Limitless." Through "Bantay ng Bayan," the chapter teamed up with the National Citizens' Movement for Free Elections (NAMFREL) in ensuring clean and honest elections; as well as the "Share-A-Smile" program, the leadership facilitated proper dental care and hygiene practices to the indigent residents

of Sitio Paktil in Benguet Province, in cooperation with the Manila Dental Association. To top his term, the chapter successfully launched "The Nomos AG Zürich Weltzeit Manila Watch," which aimed to raise funds for the benefit of "The Golden Heart Manila" project.

The following year, the president's call-to-arms to "Aim Higher" in 2017 resulted in setting the bar of excellence at its zenith with a slew of outstanding community projects that extended assistance to many of the communities' most under-served communities, such as "Project Saludo" for members of the Armed Forces of the Philippines, 2Big Impact," a water stewardship program that provided potable water to the impoverished towns of Nueva Ecija; "Run for the Mountains" that benefited the indigenous peoples of Zambales; and the "Golden Heart" donation of the renovation of the PWD unit in the Philippine General Hospital (PGH).

In 2018, the chapter also launched the "Ignacio B. Gimenez Award" for policemen in recognition of excellence in the line of duty, with the Philippine National Police. It was relaunched in 2021.

This period marked a resurgence of the chapter's profile in the national

and global spotlight, with the election of another JCI Manila leader in the person of Steve Allen C. Tycangco as National President in 2016, the first in 16 years; the conferment of four presidents in quick succession as the recipients of the "Most Outstanding JCI Local President of the World" on Presidents Roberto "Toby" P. Claudio Jr. (2010), Rodney P. Dizon Ramiro "Rami" (2012), N. Villavicencio (2016), and Niño L. Namoco (2017); and the bestowment of the chapter's eighth "Most Outstanding JCI Local Organization of the World" award in 2015 at the 71st JCI World Congress in Kanazawa, Japan.









## THE 2020s AND BEYOND: TRIUMPH AMID TRAGEDY

The third decade of the millennium began with a train wreck of a year. 2020 was an unprecedented year in global health. A novel virus that originated, possibly, with a bat only to upend the lives of virtually everyone on the planet and end the lives of roughly 1.5 million people around the world had quickly spread to all corners of the world, devastating people's lives, economies, and ways of life. In March, when the Philippines joined others worldwide in locking down as a defense against the virus, Filipinos who could work remotely figured out how to do their jobs at home. So many didn't have that privilege and lost their jobs, with no means to pay their rent or mortgage and no way to feed their families. Hunger became a major theme of 2020, presenting challenges even in countries with the means to assuage it. At the same time, parents across the world, no matter their means,

hustled to take care of-and homeschool-their kids.

Meanwhile, essential workers, from grocery-store clerks to professionals transportation to hospital nurses and physicians, continued to show up for duty. Television footages of health care workers in the news have been a routine spectacle; their faces marked by hours of wearing PPE, their eyes leaden with weariness. Sometimes unable to hold back tears, they'd describe a new

addition to their daily routine: watching patients die when they could no longer keep them alive.

While most volunteer groups stopped operations completely due to the challenges of mobility under an indefinite government-mandated lockdown, the year proved to be a historic moment for JCI Manila as it showcased its ability to adapt with the changing times with the resumption of its General Membership Meeting (GMM) in a new format - online. The pandemic

had disrupted the lives of the entire globe, and an enhanced community quarantine was instated in the island of Luzon that severely limited mobility and banned mass gatherings. In order to adapt to the new regulations, the 3rd GMM was broadcasted online for the first time via Facebook Live and boasted a consistent viewership of 220 members.

JCI Manila also partnered with 26 other JCI local organizations, as they spearheaded a project called "Sanitation for the Nation," where they donated and set-up sanitation tents equipped with fogging machines in different hospitals which served as their first line of defense against Covid-19.

On May 1 of that year, JCI Manila in

partnership with the City of Manila, Department of Education, and Department of Health began the construction of a 42-bed guarantine facility for the City of Manila. Later, JCI Manila led the funding, construction, and development of a fully-airconditioned 16-bed Emergency Quarantine Facility in Baliuag, Bulacan. In "Together We Share," the chapter provided much needed food assistance with ready-to-eat meals to two

barangays in the district of Sampaloc, Manila, which consisted of 2,000 people.

Meanwhile, the chapter's online events were in full swing as it continued conducting its GMMs online, having taken advantage of the power of digital technology as it marshalled a slew of well-known speakers in a virtual platform from across the globe. It launched a number of pandemic-assistance



-related programs, such as the "OplanDesal" Feeding Program with JCI Ortigas at Barangay Pineda in Pasig City; the installation of Solar Panels for its Community Learning Hub in Sampaloc, Manila; the award-winning "Project Empower," a joint undertaking with the Philippine Overseas Employment Administration (POEA) launched in 2021 that helped Filipinos find job opportunities across the country; "Project Tulong Kapwa" which sought to provide basic necessities to the orphans of Hospicio de San Jose and a donation drive for the indigent residents and laid-off workers in Manila; "Project Renew 2.0," a partnership with Green Antz, which turned over three handwashing stations made out of plastic to Manila's public wet markets; "Project Diwa Abra," a donation drive of numerous school supplies, solar panel set, powered air purifying respirators and sacks of

rice to the Philippine Army which were flown to two schools in the geographically isolated and disadvantaged areas in Abra.

At this time, a slew of new programs was initiated: "Gabay Aral," an initiative with JCI Manila and the young students of Pio del Pilar Elementary School in Pureza, St. Mesa, Manila; and "Ulan Sala," a donation of a water filtering facility to the residents of Barangay Dela Paz, Binan Laguna, who enjoyed access to clean and potable water in times of evacuation and calamities.



The easing of pandemic restrictions the following year saw an intensification of efforts for JCI Manila's new administration in conducting community projects. It launched "Recover Together," the

chapter's aid for various Health Care Workers (HCWs) who have been infected by Covid-19 while in the workplace, by providing cost subsidy for the hotel isolation and quarantine of infected and exposed HCWs. It reactivated the "Operation Brotherhood: Ukraine Emergency," a humanitarian fundraising drive together with the UN High Commissioner for Refugees, which provided life-saving assistance and protection to refugees fleeing Ukraine; "Oplan Damayan: Typhoon Odette," where JCI Manila facilitated the distribution of goods for the typhoon victims in Bohol; the "Pedal ng Kabuhayan" project which aided








